School Uniform

I would like to thank parents and students for their combined efforts during the summer months to ensure that all of the students followed the School Uniform Dress Code. Now that winter is upon us a reminder that our winter uniform is as follows:

<u>Girls</u> Navy pinafore Navy check skirt Navy and gold polo top (emblem) Navy windcheater (emblem) Navy and gold rugby or fleecy top Navy trackpants or blue jeans School beanie and or school scarf (navy) Boys Navy trackpants or blue jeans Navy and gold rugby or fleecy top Navy and gold polo top (emblem) Navy windcheater (emblem) School beanie and/or school scarf (navy)

Black trackpants are not part of our uniform. Over the course of the past year patterned track pants and track pants with large logos (Ghanda, Adidas etc.) have been appearing, particularly amongst our senior students with the misconception that they are part of school uniform. The argument has been that the uniform policy does not stipulate plain navy trackpants.

Following discussion at the last Governing Council Meeting a decision was made to firm up the School Uniform Dress Code policy to be plain navy trackpants with no visible patterns or logos. We are aware that our local sporting goods stores, supermarkets, speciality stores and Ghanda sell plain trackpants for the same cost as those with logos, stripes and patterns. Many of the popular brands sell trackpants with small logos or brand names on the top of pockets that would be acceptable under this policy. As many parents have recently purchased new trackpants Governing Council have indicated that here will be a phase in period of one term and an expectation that plain navy trackpants are to be worn from the beginning of Term 3.

Our Term 2 Pupil Free Day will be held on Friday 6th June which is the Friday directly before the Queen's birthday long weekend. On this day students do not attend school and teachers will be required to participate in Professional Learning.


Auskick

'What is a good text for your child to read?'

Reading books daily is essential if we want students to progress as readers. Given what the research and leaders in our field are saying, we want to teach children to choose books that are a 'good fit' for them. These are books that are of interest to the student, they can confidently read and understand and require little assistance to read. The books stretch students just a little bit so they have the opportunity to apply comprehension strategies that may be currently taught in the classroom as well as allow students to become familiar with new vocabulary, genres and writing styles!



So how do we do that?

Teachers at Reidy have been introduced to the following visual strategies to teach their students how to choose appropriate books. We encourage parents to have a go at using this strategy when visiting the library, or even when you are finding books at home for your child to read independently.

Model the '*I* - *Pick'* method for your child. Take a book you are reading and go through '*I* - *Pick'* to set an example for what it looks like and sounds like to review reading selection choices. Help your child recognize when a text is too difficult.

They are taught to ask:

- Are there five or more words on a page that I don't know?
- Is this book hard to understand?
 - When I read it, does it sound choppy and slow?


