Dear Parents and Caregivers,

Last week our Reception and Year 1 students presented their concert around the theme of Dr Seuss. Students and staff are to be congratulated on an excellent performance; the enthusiasm and enjoyment of students was wonderful to see. This concert will be the first of many high quality opportunities these students will have during their time at Reidy Park as a part of the school's Performing Arts program. Student participation in the Performing Arts enables students to develop a range of skills and dispositions which are transferrable to other areas of their learning. It was evident during the Upper Primary debating activities earlier in the term our students were able to apply their experiences in the Performing Arts to speak and present confidently to an audience.

Staff Professional Development

A reminder that this Friday, September 15th, is a pupil free day. Staff will spend the day participating in a professional development workshop focused on planning and moderation which are key DECD priorities for 2017. Along with pupil free days, staff are continually engaging in professional development activities throughout the year. Recently staff have worked through a teaching cycle focused on writing which involved teachers working in teams to analyse student work, set goals for student learning and directions for their teaching and then reflect on the growth of student learning. These teaching cycles provide an effective way for teachers to collaborate, share expertise and focus on student learning. Another upcoming activity that staff will be staff participating in is lesson observations. Lesson observations provide a context for teachers to seek and receive feedback about their classroom practice. In conjunction with this initiative, teachers will also be seeking feedback from students. This will involve teachers getting information from their students about their engagement in class

activities and learning habits. These feedback opportunities reflect a strong commitment from teachers at Reidy Park to continually develop their skills and knowledge and facilitates learning environments that value 'student voice'.

Pedestrian Safety and School Arrival.

It has been brought to our attention that some families are choosing to cross the road along Wehl St near the school Library rather than use the designated crossing lights area. Due to the large amount of traffic, including buses, this is not a safe option and we encourage all members of the school community to use the set crossing areas.

Another matter that we require family support with is the increase in students arriving early at school. Many of these students are arriving early to socialise with their friends however we are quite mindful of their safety. Yard duty supervision commences at 8.25am therefore students should not arrive prior to this time. Students who are seen by staff in the yard are asked to wait inside the office until playground supervision

begins. Regular early attenders may be booked into OSHC which would be at cost to families.

LOTE (Language other than English)

Our current LOTE Italian teacher Ms D'Onghia has made the decision to move to Adelaide at the end of this year. Ms D'Onghia has been the Italian teacher at Reidy Park for the past 6 years.

In planning for this change in staffing the school has reviewed the direction of LOTE and as an outcome, the school will look to transition our students to learning Japanese as a second language. The importance of engaging with Asian perspectives has been identified in the Australian Curriculum for a variety of reasons:

- Australia is increasingly looking to Asia strategically, politically and culturally as well as economically. Correspondingly, Asia literacy is going to be a key requirement of our young people, as Australia seeks to strengthen its ties in the Asia region. For this, young people will need broad insight into the histories of the countries of the Asia region, including their shared history with Australia, its complex and diverse cultures and an understanding of the contemporary challenges and opportunities that exist for the region.
- The Asia region exerts enormous influence globally and in Australia. Asia is the most populous region in the world, being home to twothirds of the world's people. Some of the world's most dynamic, varied and complex societies are in the Asia region. It will soon also be both the largest producer and consumer of goods and services in the world.
- In 2014, 11 of Australia's top 15 export markets (goods and services) were in the Asia region, making up nearly 71 per cent of all exports. As well, approximately 58 per cent of Australia's two -way trade occurred with countries of the Asia region.

As a school located in a regional area, consideration also needs to be given toward the challenges that are associated with employing a teacher who has expertise in this area, therefore, if the position cannot be filled, the school will look to retain Italian as the language taught next year.

Opinion Surveys

As a part of our school's self-review processes families have the opportunity to complete the annual Parent Opinion Survey. This survey has been developed by ACARA and covers 12 key areas that were developed in collaboration between the various education systems (Government, Catholic and Independent). The information provided in the survey will help inform areas of strength and potential future priorities. An SMS message will be sent in the coming days with an anonymous online link to complete the survey and we would appreciate you taking the time to complete it. The survey will be open until Friday September 29th.

Physical Education Spotlight

Reidy Park has had a great deal of success lately in terms of school sport competitions. Recently, Mr McShane took two Yr 6/7 female and two Yr 6/7 male basketball teams to compete in a round robin competition at the Icehouse. Both teams made it through to the regional round which was a great result in itself. Our male team was successful in winning the overall competition and for the first time ever, now competing in a state-wide competition on Thursday, Sept 21st in Adelaide.

Our Yr 4/5 students also recently participated in a district basketball carnival with Mr McShane taking four teams to compete at the Icehouse. Our two female teams did a great job winning many games. Our 'A' female team came second overall and now have the opportunity to play in Adelaide in the state wide tournament at Wayville on Wednesday, September 20th. The two male teams also played very well with our 'A' Team winning the final. They have also been invited to play in Adelaide. Mr McShane would like to say a special thanks to the coaches and students who helped out on the day. It was much appreciated.

In other news, many of our Yr 6/7 students are currently trying out for spots in the Lower South East cricket and tennis SAPSASA teams. The state-wide round robin competition in these sports will be held in Adelaide in November. Mr McShane will be coaching the

cricket team. In our daily P.E. lessons, students have been learning how to play badminton and volleyball. Mr McShane has been running lunchtime badminton competitions for Yr 6/7 students which has been very successful. Reidy Park's Yr 3/4/5 soccer players have been doing a great job on Saturday mornings representing our school in soccer. Thank you Duane Gertners for to coaching the team and Jensen and Henry for umpiring.




Numeracy News
