Dear Parents/Caregivers

Last week our staff participated in a Literacy professional development workshop focused on writing. The workshop provided a range of helpful strategies and activities that teachers can use to help develop their students' writing skills and knowledge. Along with these practical ideas, several important themes were reinforced during the day. This included the importance of oral language; the opportunity for students to discuss their ideas, collaborate with others and develop their vocabulary are crucial to the writing process. Another emphasis was the fostering of creativity. The presenter highlighted that often children will experience blockers in their writing because they may become too focused on the spelling demands of their work rather than their ideas. They advocated that it is important for students to mostly focus on their ideas at that point in the writing process, after which they can more carefully engage with the editing stage by checking areas such as spelling and grammar. The third theme was the value of repetition, which applies to all areas of learning, not just writing. Regular practice helps children embed skills and knowledge which can then be applied more fluently and confidently.

Attendance Information

Regular attendance is a crucial foundation for all children's learning and progress at school, reasons for this include:

- Regular attendance leads to an increased likelihood of being successful at school.
- Getting maximum benefit from school will optimise a child's life choices.
- Attending school regularly will develop skills and attitudes that will help students to be successful later in life, these include punctuality, being organised and self-discipline.

The Education Department has set the target of achieving a 95% attendance rate for all students. Currently, our attendance rate to this point in the year is 95.4% which is an excellent outcome (for a child to

achieve an attendance rate of 95% it means being absent from school for no more than approximately 2 days a term). A summary of each year level's attendance rate to this point in the year is below:

In cases of student absence, we request that parents/carers provide a signed note to their child's class teacher, or you can fill out the absentee form on School Stream. If a student has an appointment (eg. doctor, dentist etc.) a note is also required. Absences that are greater than 5 days and up to one month in length, for reasons such as family holidays or medical needs, require an exemption form which is available from the Front Office.

In relation to late arrivals or early departures, we acknowledge that things may arise that can cause children to be late and accept these occasions, however, arriving late on a regular basis is unsatisfactory. All students are expected to arrive at school by the first morning bell at 8.45am with roll books marked at 8.55am. A student who arrives after 8.55am will be marked as late. Late arrivals will be required to sign in at the Front Office from 8.55am. In some cases students may need to leave early; students who leave the school

during the day will need to sign out from the Front Office (parents are encouraged to schedule appointments outside of school hours where possible). If a student does need to leave school early, they will need to be picked up from the Front Office.



Room 17 - Living Things

This term we are studying <u>"Living Things"</u> for our unit of inquiry. We will be looking at how living things grow, change and have offspring; native animals in our local environment; endangered and threatened species; how humans impact on the habitats of animals and how we can care for our environment. We will be planting seeds and recording their growth; looking at plants in our local area and the types of seeds and flowers that different plants produce.

Some examples of our endangered species for the local area are; the Growling Grass Frog, the Heath Mouse, the Orange Bellied Parrot and the Southern Bent Wing Bat. We will be presenting some our work at the school assembly in week 6.







Room 4 - Abstract Trees

As part of our arts program we have been exploring the different elements of visual arts. Combining the elements, we have created amazing abstract trees. Our art work includes lines, shape, both primary and secondary colours, space and some trees even demonstrate form. Room 4 loved learning about how they could combine different elements into one piece of art. Some of our art pieces are still being finished but will be put on display in our room when they are completed.
