Dear Parents and Caregivers,

This is our final newsletter for Term 3. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of our family volunteers who have assisted throughout the term; this support is greatly appreciated and provides valuable assistance for class activities. At the end of each term it is important to reflect on the fantastic effort that our students display towards their learning. Our teachers have very high expectations for student learning and behaviour and it is great to see them consistently try their best in these areas.

Next term we look forward to a number of important events including transition days (in Week 8) for our current Year 7s, as well as the intake of new Reception students for 2019. A Colour Run initiative, organised in collaboration between our student leaders and the fundraising committee, has also been planned. Next term will also see the commencement of class planning processes; further details about this process will be provided in future newsletters.

NAPLAN

Earlier this week, 2018 NAPLAN information was sent home to families of our Yr 3, 5 and 7 students. The NAPLAN achievement reports provide useful feedback for teachers, as they indicate the strengths and areas for improvement that can be worked on with students. It is important to acknowledge that NAPLAN results are a snapshot of one type of assessment and that overall student achievement is measured by a variety of assessment types, of which NAPLAN is a part. As well as looking at individual student achievement, NAPLAN results allow our school to compare each cohort of students over time, and to examine trends. This year, the initial analysis of the results shows the performance of students in Years 3, 5 and 7 to be on par with previous years. The assessed areas predominantly indicated that the school's achievement was close to national averages. A further measure recently implemented by the Education Department is an overall

rating of the school's NAPLAN achievement that combines both Reading and Numeracy results. According to this measure, our school has achieved growth and improvement over the past 2 years. Whilst this is a pleasing outcome, our challenge is to consistently aim high and work towards achieving sustained strong performance and growth for all students. Mathematics Pupil Free Day

Monday's training and development provided an excellent opportunity for staff to consolidate their learning in areas that have been a key focus for us this year. This has included the importance of developing students' use of mathematics vocabulary, problem solving and targeted teaching of concepts. During the day, staff also spent time reflecting on their practice and collaboratively planning with peers to support the continued implementation of the focus areas in the classroom.



Room 1 - Science News



Room 8 - Reading Challenge
