Dear Parents and Caregivers,

There have been many highlights including: concert and musical performances, learning showcases at assembly, sporting achievements and students' day to day application toward their class work I would also like to thank the many parents and other family members who have assisted with class and school events; this help is always greatly appreciated. Cyber Safety

It has come to our attention that there has been some issues in relation to student use of social media platforms. Below is some information, supplied by the Department for Education, which provides some guidelines in this area.

What can children do if they read inappropriate comments written by some else?

- If they know someone is causing problems, tell the person they should stop. If they don't feel safe to say something, children should tell a person who can take action eg. a trusted adult.
- Protect their private information: do not share passwords.
- Do not respond by spreading rumours, sharing information or teasing.

What can parents/carers do if their child has an issue on social media?

- Praise them for telling you. This may be a big step for them, don't be angry and let them know that you will help them.
- Do not respond to any inappropriate message that your child received. Save the content eg. take a screen shot.
- Inform your child's teacher. It is important that the school knows what is going on so we can provide support and monitor any issues that may spill into the class/

playground.

- Help your child block and delete whoever is sending the message.
- Have some 'down time' without technology. It is important for both mental and physical health that your child's life is balanced so they are not constantly online or spending hours on a mobile phone. This should not be used as a punishment, rather as some peaceful time when they are not being bothered.
- If the concern is ongoing, you can consider reporting the matter to the police. Most cyberbullying between students can be resolved at school level. A police report may be necessary where: despite the best efforts of the school, bullying does not stop; when it is not possible to know who is behind the abuse (e.g. fake accounts/ blocked numbers); or when threats have been made to your child's personal safety.

What can parents/carers do if their child is posting inappropriate comments on social media?

- It often comes as a shock to be told that your child has been engaging in this behaviour. It is important that parents support schools in their handling of the situation. Don't try and play it down.
- Be involved and aware of what your child is doing online.
- Discuss with your child why it is not acceptable behaviour; let them see there are consequences.
- Acknowledge that they may be feeling guilty about their behaviour and discuss ways that they can rectify the situation.
- Set clear rules and boundaries about their online behaviour and your expectations and consequences for breaching this agreement.

We hope that this information has been helpful for you. We encourage you to discuss the use of social media with your child; children feel empowered and less distressed by online content when they are equipped with information about how to protect themselves.

2019 Japanese Grading Information

In 2018 we began teaching Japanese at Reidy Park. As students had only completed one year of study, grade levels were not assigned. Japanese is a very complex language and involves the teaching of Hiragana and Katakana syllabaries (alphabets) as well as characters originally borrowed from the Chinese language for reading and writing. All students began on the same level and although they made progress, they were unable to reach the standard required for their year level in such a short space of time. As students progress in their year levels, they will gradually reach the assessment standards required and will be assessed accordingly; it is anticipated that this transition will take approximately 3 years. Below is a table the indicates what grade level your child will be assessed at in 2019.



Room 17 News

This term we have been studying a unit of inquiry called "Living Things". We have been looking at how living things grow, change and have offspring; native animals in our local area; endangered and threatened species and how humans impact on the habitats of animals. Using IPADS and computers, the students did some research and discovered that the Growling Grass Frog, Heath Mouse and Southern Bent Wing Bat are three species of animals that live in our area and are endangered. Students also studied plant life cycles and planted some snow pea seeds in our school garden patch.

NAIDOC Week

Next week Reidy Park will be celebrating NAIDOC week. NAIDOC week is all about celebrating our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and their achievements. The student leaders have planned the following activities for all Reidy Park students: A flag ceremony, where both the Australian and Aboriginal flags will be raised at approximately 9am. This will occur on Tuesday for Year 4 - 7



and Wednesday for Reception - Year 3. After the flag raising ceremony on Wednesday we will be planting a 'Tree of Truth'. Parents and caregivers are welcome to come and join our students for these events. There will also be daily quizzes on the student message board and profiles on successful Indigenous Australians.

Year 6 /7 Visual Arts

Traditionally at Reidy Park, students that do not participate in the Musical, complete a visual arts unit of work. Students were allocated to either Room 10 with Mr Bannister or Room 13 with Miss Magarey. In Room 13 we focused on how art impacts our lives. We looked at specific artists that had impacted society such as Australian artists Ken Done, Sidney Nolan and John Olsen. Along with International artists Pablo Picasso and Vincent Van Gogh. Through the work of these artists the students explored the art elements of colour, space, line and texture and created artworks to represent these elements. The students then used their knowledge to show their understanding of these elements in their own creations that are on display in our North Wing corridor. The students needed to plan these artworks, identify the mediums they wanted to use and the materials needed to complete the artworks, decide how they wanted to present the artworks and then critique their final products.
